Motives

Abigail

Motivation:

- Abigail is motivated by her concern for Betty and by her desire to appear innocent. She wants to get in as little trouble as possible.
 Hidden?
- Absolutely, although she does reveal some details as she tries to remain innocent. She accuses others of witchcraft to make her crimes seem less.
- Unaware of motives?
- No; Abigail is completely aware of her motives and is trying to stay out of trouble.

Mrs. Putnam

Motivation:

Mrs. Putnam has lost seven children at birth. She has to have a reason for her grief—the babies were murdered—and she wants to find out who to blame.

Hidden?

No; she tells of the dead children; admits to sending Ruth to Tituba; declares her belief in the presence of the Devil's work
Unaware of motives?
Unlikely; she seems to be controlled by her grief.

Reverend Hale Motivation: Hale is motivated by his faith, his belief in the Devil, and how he has prepared himself to detect the workings of the Devil. Hidden? No; he says he can detect witchcraft; others are aware of his reputation. Unaware of motives? Perhaps; Hale's confirmation of the presence of witchcraft may "prove" his expertise and raise his status in society.
